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

# AAPI Pride:

An examination of LGBTQ+ Asian-American/Pacific Islanders' cultural identity crisis

"Traditional AAPI community and family values can often be at odds with the highly individualistic values of mainstream American culture, and individuals may feel that they face a choice between disappointing their family or remaining an "outsider" to non-AAPI friends, classmates and broader society." - NAMI

#### WHAT DOES ALL OF THIS MEAN?

I don't see a lot of Asian-Americans or Pacific Islanders who aren't cishet

I have been out as bisexual since 2020, and for two years since then, I didn't see any LGBTQ AAPI in any form of entertainment, even those that have been written with gay or Asian audiences in mind.

Now, I know of a few K-Pop idols, a singer named dhruv, and Jobu Tupaki, the villain of Everything Everywhere, All at Once (which is at its core an epic tale about intergenerational conflict). Meanwhile, within my circle of friends, I know at least five times as many outwardly LGBTQ AAPI by name. I may know plenty of queer AAPI today, but the fact remains that it's difficult for young people like me to reach that point in the first place.

Gay AAPI are what I consider "triple-queer." In other words, we experience otherness in the wider context of American cultural standards, the more intimate scenes of family drama, and in the annoyingly exclusive world of gay dating in the US, particularly in regards to gay men. As Asians, we're often stereotyped as feminine and nerdy. As queer folks, we're considered undesirable and degenerate by members of our own families.

All this pressure to change and conform to a whirlwind of conflicting normalcies can lead to some drastic repercussions:

So, with all of this doomsaying out of the way, I'm going to use this limited space to pass on a message for people like me, who have been faced with racism and homophobia since they could walk on two feet.

> You aren't alone. We're here, and we're fighting for a better future for us all.

# The B Word

1859, anatomist Robert Bentley Todd first used the term 'bisexuality' to refer to the possession of 'male' and 'female' physical characteristics in the same body – today, we might understand this as being intersex



Bisexuality is the sexual and/or romantic attraction to multiple genders. 1915, Sigmund Freud made his famous claim about 'universal' bisexuality in 1915, but referred to this both as a combination of masculinity and femininity and as a sexual or romantic attraction, writing, "the sexual object is a kind of reflection of the subject's bisexual nature".

1970s, the current understanding of bisexuality, as an orientation or capacity for attraction, became widely accepted in the UK as "the more common usage".

There is a double standard between being prudish and being perverse. For example, this can be seen in media like The Breakfast Club: "If you haven't [had sex], you're a prude. If you have [had sex], you're a slut. This is an issue specific to women, specifically women in the LGBTQ+ community. For example, lesbians are often sexualized and fetishized as a result of the common confusion between the erotic and sexual. According to Audre Lorde, people often use 'the pornographic' in order to talk about normative sexuality, which is not reflective of how the erotic is larger than sexual. Therefore, this may give way for lesbians to fulfill the colonial-modern capitalist status quo of homonormativity, whereas gay men may not have the same opportunity, as lesbians are highly sexualized and associated with the pornographic, while gay men often face various different forms of homophobia by association with the erotic.

#### **Breaking Binary Boundaries**

A Journey Beyond the Gender Binary

The gender binary is a socially constructed system that confines people to two rigid categories: male and female. This binary erases the existence and experiences of those who identify outside of these categories. Let's explore the diverse spectrum of gender identities and expressions that break free from this binary!

<u>Non-Binary: An</u> umbrella term for gender identities that don't fit within the traditional categories of male or female. Some non-binary individuals may identify as genderqueer, genderfluid, or agender, among others.

<u>Two-Spirit: A</u> term used by some Indigenous North American communities to describe individuals who hold both masculine and feminine qualities. It's important to remember that this term is culturally specific and should not be appropriated.

Genderfluid: A gender identity that is not fixed and can change over time. Individuals who identify as genderfluid may feel more masculine, feminine, or neutral on different days or in different situations.

Hijra: A term used in South Asia to describe individuals who don't fit within the traditional male or female categories. The Hijra community has a long history and is recognized in some countries with legal rights and protections. Be an ally! Educate yourself about diverse gender

identities and expressions. Respect people's pronouns, challenge your assumptions and create inclusive spaces. Remember, gender is a spectrum, not a binary.

Im simply a big hearted empathic lover Not your assumed angry black women stereotyped cover



# **Queer Aromanticism**

Navigating the the Economies of Care



#### **CAPITALIST CARE**

For many aromantics, the colonial capitalist emphasis on monogamously heterosexual romantic love and nuclear families (the "economies of care") can make accessing basic resources, such as healthcare and housing, difficult. It also deems people without romantic partners "incomplete" and "failures" when it comes to fulfilling what supposedly makes us human.

#### **CHOSEN FAMILY**

As queer folks, we know that family isn't just something you're born into. Building a support system of friends, partners, and community is essential for our survival and well-being. However, chosen families can also face unique challenges and require intentional effort to build and maintain. While shared values definitely help in initially forming a chosen family, it is helpful in the long run to seek out people with diverse ideas so that we learn from one another.

#### **SELF-CARE STRATEGIES**

In a world that tells us we're incomplete without romance, it's important to prioritize our own wellbeing. From journaling to taking long walks, there are many ways to practice self-care. However, selfcare is not accessible to everyone, and it is important to acknowledge the systemic barriers that prevent some individuals from accessing resources that promote well-being.

# QUEERPLATONIC RELATIONSHIPS

Queerplatonic relationships (QPRs) are often overlooked in discussions of care and relationships, yet they can be just as important, if not more so, than romantic partnerships. Aromanticism challenges the societal assumption that romantic relationships are the most important relationships. Queer aros often rely on QPRs as a primary form of care and support, highlighting the importance of recognizing and valuing non-romantic relationships. It is important to realize that, much like the foundation of being queer, there is no "correct" or "ideal" QPR. It might resemble a traditional romantic relationship, or it might look more like a friendship. Don't let the relationship define you, make the relationship fit to suit your needs and characteristics.

youth have contemplated suicide? A study done by the Trevor Project revealed that 45% youth have considered suicide in the past year, 60% looking for were for mental health care but were unable to get it, and 73% of LGBTQ youth have experienced discrimination.



Almost half of the LGBTQ Help Prevent it LGBTQ youth are more likely commit suicide due to the lack of support they receive. Both in schools and at home, they are not able to feel supported validated which leads to them feeling like no one accepts them or cares about them leading to depression which can lead to suicide. LGBTQ community is constantly made to feel alone and that something is wrong with them which results in high suicide and depression rates.

KHWAJA SIRAS, ALSO KNOWN AS HIJRAS (ALTHOUGH MANY WANT TO ABANDON THIS NAME DUE TO ITS NEGATIVE CONNOTATION), ARE THE TRANSGENDER POPULATION IN PAKISTAN. DESPITE THE PAKISTANI SUPREME COURT LEGALLY RECOGNIZING THEM AS A THIRD GENDER ON NATIONAL IDENTITY CARDS, IT HAS PROVEN DIFFICULT FOR THEM TO BE ISSUED. AS A RESULT THEY CAN'T APPLY TO JOBS AND RESORT TO SEX WORK AND BEGGING.

#### "IT'S NOT SLAVERY, IT'S OUR CUSTOM", ONE GURU SAYS.

IT IS COMMON THAT NEW KHWAJA SIRAS GET INITIATED INTO THE COMMUNITY BY SIGNING WITH A GURU. THEY ARE TOLD THAT THEY NEED TO MAKE A CERTAIN AMOUNT OF MONEY (THAT THE GURU WILL TAKE A CUT OF) OR ELSE THEY RISK LOSING THEIR FOOD/WATER AND GETTING SHUNNED. THIS IS WHY THEY SPEND THEIR DAYS AND NIGHTS RISKING THEIR LIVES BY WALKING THROUGH TRAFFIC TO ASK FOR MONEY, OR TO PERFORM SEXUAL ACTS FOR THE EQUIVALENT OF 20 US DOLLARS, MANY OF THESE WOMEN GET SEXUALLY ASSAULTED ON THE JOB. AND SOME EVEN GET SEVERELY INJURED OR KILLED.

# "DREAMS DON'T COME TRUE FOR PEOPLE LIKE US."

MANY LAYERS OF CULTURE AND RELIGION COME TOGETHER TO GO AGAINST THE TRANSGENDER COMMUNITY. MARRIAGE IS A VITAL PART OF NUMEROUS PAKISTANIS LIVES BUT IT IS ILLEGAL TO MARRY THE SAME OR THIRD GENDER. THESE WOMEN OFTEN GET BOYFRIENDS UNTIL HE IS MARRIED OFF, LEAVING THEM ALL ALONE. WHILE BEING GAY IS SEEN AS SINFUL, MANY MEN PAY TO HAVE SEX WITH KHWAJA SIRAS THAT THEY CONSIDER "SPECIAL" BUT SOMETHING THEY "CAN'T TALK ABOUT."



"IF IT WERE IN MY HANDS I'D BE HAPPY TO BE A DOG JUST SO I COULD LIVE WITH MY MOTHER."

"Liberals don't really *have* beliefs. Sometimes they stumble on one, like on a child's toy left on the carpet. The toy must be put away immediately. And the child reprimanded. Liberalism isn't change — not even incremental change. It is *control*."

The histories of every movement to free a marginalized group of people share many common threads - but one of the most bothersome among these threads is the ball and chain of the liberal movement that came attached to it. Liberals are a group of people who, at least nominally, stand with the oppressed and strive to see the injustices committed against them corrected – but the kinship ends there. Take for example, the legitimately revolutionary currents of the Queer Liberation movement.

Throughout its entire history, the spearhead for queer rights and the movement's most influential personalities carried with them far more than just vague calls for social change. Figures like Leslie Feinberg, Marsha P. Johnson, Harry Hay, Audre Lorde, all strove for something far greater than the idea of 'gay rights.'

They were fighting for queer liberation - a reshaping of the world that would do more than just let gay people get married or criminalize discrimination on the basis of sexuality - a world where instead, queer people of all stripes and colors would be truly free. They fought for a world that threatened capitalism, that threatened all existing hierarchies, and a world that genuinely wanted to tear down the status quo. A more just world threatens the comfortable, unjust system a liberal already benefits from; which so begins their constant effort to moderate an inherently radical movement.


Liberals live in a world fraught with massive injustice and conflict on institutional scales, but they aren't bothered by any of it, except which threatens a basic multicultural pluralism (basic gay rights, marriage, so on and so forth.) The Queer Liberation movement is a movement that pushes forward positive change, and liberals see any change and any driving force behind change as something negative, and to be reined in. They smother figures like Marsha P. Johnson, and replace the riots and bricks thrown at Stonewall with rainbow colored coke cans and cops at pride.

It would do all of us well to remember the roots of the Queer Liberation movement, and toss liberalism to the side. Actual, tangible, true freedom and happiness for queer people cannot come with the status quo's moderation.



There is often a narrative that the queer movement happened in the past and equal rights were achieved. This obscures the truth, that oppressive systems control our lives, and the government continues to target and criminalize the queer community.





The first photo was taken from Stonewall Inn Riots in 1969, the second after the Rainbow Lounge Raid in 2009. In both cases, police raided gay bars, harassing and assaulting patrons. The striking similarities show that the fight is not over and warn against complacency.

Across America today, anti-trans legislation like anti-drag bills hearken back to a time when anti-cross dressing laws were standard. These laws were used by the police to target trans and other non-conforming members of society.
Today they are being brought back in another form to criminalize being trans and give the police an easy opportunity to abuse their power.

Inspired by: "Fugitive Flesh: gender self-determination, Queer abolition, and trans resistance" by Eric A. Stanley I challenge you to love. Love the communities you' re a part of and the future ones you' II form. Love the conversations and connections you make with members of these communities which expand your understanding of the world. Love those around you beyond the confining ideas of romance. Love them because they're here and require support in the face of oppression. Love the deeply erotic parts of yourself that house your desires, spark and drive. And lastly, in the wise words of Alice Walker, Love yourself. Regardless.



**KPERIMENT** 

The Tuskegee Experiment began in the early 1930s to 1970s in rural Alabama. The experiments were conducted on 600 African American men to study the progression of syphilis. These men were told that they were being treated for "bad blood" and promised free health care for participating in this experiment. The Health care professionals gave the impression that they were "treating" these men but in reality were given placebos and mineral supplements.

Despite the fact that penicillin was an available form of treatment for supplils in 1947, to gather data on the prolonged effects of untreated supplils these healthcare workers continued their experiment. Since the participants thought they were getting better through treatment, these men continued having sex with their spouses, which led to pregnancies where the mother and infant also contracted the contagious disease.

The Tuskegee Experiments are a reminder of the racism and discrimination against African Americans in the United States. Black men were seen as animals, hypersexual, less than human, numbers, etc. so they were experimented on for the white man's gain. African Americans are considered "other" or outside of the hegemonic norm. They were denied basic human rights such as adequate healthcare and subjected to medical malpractice. This was an unethical experiment that has caused continued distrust and fear from the black community towards public health professionals and vaccines today.

A LATIN AMERICAN LEGACY


1889-1984



One of the earliest documented transgender figures in Latin American history, Amelio was a colonel who was recognized for the masculine identity he adopted- not only by his community, but the military as well. He was awarded for his accomplishments in the Zapatista movement and received honors.

Amelio made the front page of El Universal, Mexico's largest newspaper, after being interviewed and photographed. In the nowfamous photograph, Robles proudly poses while holding his personal pistol and a cigarette.





# Sex

The categorization of an individual using two main categories (male and female) on the basis of biology. Sex is assigned at birth and does not necessarily correlate to one's gender identity.

There are "primary" and "secondary" sexual characteristics, AFAB (Assigned Female at Birth) and AMAB, intersex and so on.

# **Glossaryof Term**

An expression of identity which can be communicated through a highly fluid and socially informed set of behaviors, attitudes, presentation choices, and other selfexpressions.

# Gender

People can have their own gender identity and gender expression. There are cisgender and transgender. There are different beliefs like gender binary or gender non-conforming (out of the binary) or two-spirit. Please ask people's gender pronouns that they used to identify themselves.

# Sexuality

An expression of identity defined by feelings of sexual attraction, mainly informed by gender identity. Many people experience sexual orientation fluidly, and feel attraction or degrees of attraction to different genders at different points in their lives.

You can be heterosexual or homosexual or bisexual or asexual or pansexual or queer...you can be yourself.
